A short history of April Fools' Day

On this day in 1700, English pranksters begin popularizing the annual tradition of April Fools' Day by playing practical jokes on each other. Although the day, also called All Fools' Day, has been celebrated for several centuries by different cultures, its exact origins remain a mystery.

Some historians speculate that April Fools' Day dates back to 1582, when France switched from the Julian calendar to the Gregorian calendar, as called for by the Council of Trent in 1563. People who were slow to get the news or failed to recognize that the start of the new year had moved to January 1 and continued to celebrate it during the last week of March through April 1 became the butt of jokes and hoaxes. These pranks included having paper fish placed on their backs and being referred to as "poisson d'avril" (April fish), said to symbolize a young, easily caught fish and a gullible person.

Historians have also linked April Fools' Day to festivals such as Hilaria, which was celebrated in ancient Rome at the end of March and involved people dressing up in disguises. There's also speculation that April Fools' Day was tied to the vernal equinox, or first day of spring in the Northern Hemisphere, when Mother Nature fooled people with changing, unpredictable weather. April Fools' Day spread throughout Britain during the 18th century.

In modern times, people have gone to great lengths to create elaborate April Fools' Day hoaxes. Newspapers, radio and TV stations and Web sites have participated in the April 1 tradition of reporting outrageous fictional claims that have fooled their audiences. In 1957, the BBC reported that Swiss farmers were experiencing a record spaghetti crop and showed footage of people harvesting noodles from trees; numerous viewers were fooled.

Northlew and Ashbury Produce and Craft Show at the Northlew Fun Day

Following on from last year's successful sunflower seed planting session at the Northlew Fun Day, the Produce Show Committee will be offering children the opportunity to engage in another free activity. Children will be able to plant their own runner beans in a pot to take home and nurture.



The challenge is to bring the longest runner bean pod back to exhibit at the Northlew and

Ashbury Produce and Craft Show on Saturday 8th September.

Entries to all children's classes are free and there are certificates to be won!

There will be two competitions, one for eight year olds and under and one for nine to sixteen year olds.

How to grow runner beans

- 1. Fill your pot with compost, leaving a centimetre at the top.
- 2. Make two holes with your finger, put a runner bean in each and cover with soil.
- 3. Press down firmly and spray with water.
- 4. Place the pot on a window sill and water a little every day to keep the compost moist.
- 5. After a couple of weeks, the beans should be tall enough to move outdoors about 10 to 15 centimetres tall.
- 6. Leave the pot outdoors for a couple of days for the beans to harden off.
- 7. Replant the bean plants individually, either into a

very large pot or planter, or directly into the ground.

- 8. Provide a cane and some string for the runner bean plants to grow up.
- Remember to keep watering each day, especially if the weather is dry.
- 10. When the flowers die off, small beans will appear and grow longer very quickly.
- 11. Pick the beans when they are quite small and tender, to cook and eat, but leave a few to get longer and bring the longest to the Produce Show on Saturday 8th September 2018 to enter the challenge.

Gardening Tips for the month

A time for optimism

I have decided that this April will be glorious.....we have all had quite enough grim weather, so it's high time for some sun. Care for a bet anyone?

This is usually the time when panic sets in....all those months when nothing really grew are suddenly a distant memory. It's an exciting month, despite the vagaries of the weather.

As usual I am writing this in conditions completely unsuitable for the tasks I'm about to recommend i.e. we have 3 foot snow drifts here and had to dig the front door out this morning. As always though, optimism wins.

Bedding plants

A word of warning – if, in a fit of enthusiasm you have been to the garden centre and bought tender and half hardy bedding plants, please protect them....especially if they're from a big chain store – they won't have been properly hardened off and a single frost will put paid to them. So, if cold winds or frost are forecast, pop them indoors and bring them out again when conditions are warmer – or quite simply, don't bother buying them until May!

Seed sowing

I will reiterate last month's advice on seed sowing and say that if the ground is still cold and sodden, then wait to sow until conditions improve and sow seeds in trays and pots indoors instead.

Feed ericaceous shrubs

Now is a great time to give ericaceous shrubs like azaleas and rhododendrons a light feed of blood fish and bone and a mulch around the base of dead fern leaves (free) or ericaceous compost (not free). If they are looking a little yellow, then do give a Sequestrene feed too – they do struggle sometimes in a neutral soil after a long wet winter.

Roses

Roses too appreciate a slow release granular rose feed and a good mulch of well-rotted manure or garden compost (they are greedy plants).

Potatoes

Potatoes are traditionally planted on Good Friday so somewhere around the beginning of the month would be fine. The South West is a nightmare for blight on main crops or second earlies, but I tried "Nicola" last year, having been assured locally in Cornwall that they would succumb to the wretched disease. Knowing that the newer strains of this variety aren't that resistant to blight. I didn't have high hopes. But they did brilliantly and produced some of the nicest potatoes I have ever had. I always cut down any affected foliage at the first sign of blotches appearing and wilting and leave the tubers in the soil. This almost always saves the crop even if it means a lighter vield.

Dividing plants

Hostas can be divided now – splitting big clumps with two spades back-to-back and replanting the sections. Primroses can also be divided and replanted after flowering, as can snowdrops- a great way to increase your display for next Spring.

Penstemons

Penstemons can at long last be cut back to the base so long as there are green leaves there. If not, just cut back to the lowest set of leaves. I love this job – they invariably look awful for months before. The temptation to cut them back in the winter should be resisted if possible. I also like to trim over winter flowering heathers, to avoid them getting leggy and woody. Cut back to just below the old flower head.

Just remember to keep protecting any vulnerable plants from frost, hail or cold winds, they will reward you later.

Northlew Nature Watch

March certainly produced some challenges for us humans, with shortages in the shops, and no mail deliveries for several days.

So spare a thought for our wildlife. How did they cope with prolonged freezing temperatures and heavy snow?

Well. I am sure there were some casualties, but wildlife is surprisingly resilient. During the winter of 1963, we had snow and sub-zero temperatures for two months, from Boxing Day to the end of February. Studies showed that we lost 50% of all our wild birds during that winter. the little Wren being one of the major casualties. Yet 5 years on, the Wren had returned to being one of our commonest birds. Those of you, who feed birds in vour gardens, will have noticed an increase in the numbers of your usual visitors, along with birds who do not usually come to gardens. Among those could have been Fieldfare. Redwing. Song Thrushes, Goldcrest, and Siskin.

Great Spotted Woodpecker are continuing to 'drum' on tree Published by the Parish Council April 2018 trunks, to stake out their territory, and invite a mate. A similar bird is the Lesser Spotted Woodpecker, but they are only Sparrow size, and much rarer, so if you see one, you are very fortunate.

Walking around the area during February, frog spawn could be seen in many of the small pools and puddles. How did that get on in the recent freezing conditions? Again, much of it will have been frozen, and subsequently perished, but a visit to some I spotted in February, along the path up to Ashbury Church, had hatched out, and the tadpoles were happily swimming about.

A note about 'vermin' and Owls Throughout winter we might experience the highest level of rodent visitors to our barns, sheds and houses. Who can blame them? Shelter and food are basic essentials for them too.

Unfortunately, a very high percentage of owls have rat and mouse poison in their bodies! The reason is simple, they find it easy to pick off a half dead rodent who has been eating poison. Following these simple steps, and you will keep rats and mouse numbers down, whilst protecting wildlife :

- Keep all animal feeds in rodent proof containers.
- Set traps that kill the rodents instantly. They die quickly instead of a longer death from poison with the risk of the owls getting poisoned too!!

Devon Air Ambulance Night Time Landing Site Update

As noted in last month's newsletter, we were hoping that this project would have been completed by the end of March i.e. before the Easter holiday starts and the signs looked good. However, due to a variety of factors beyond the Parish Council's control and not least because of the inclement weather in March, this has not been possible. We are continuing to do everything in our control to get things back on track so that the night time landing light column is put in place as soon as possible, is tested by Devon Air Ambulance (although we won't be told a definite time when they will do this) and the landscaping finished so that the playing field can be reopened. As works are not yet complete the playing field will remain closed for safety reasons. We ask that all parishioners observe and respect the closure of the playing field during this time as indicated by the notices on the gates.

2. Okehampton WDBC Office Closing

West Devon Borough Council is reminding customers that their office on St James St, Okehampton will be closing on 6th April 2018.

Customer footfall has been falling at the office year-on-year as customers increasingly use other methods to pay their bills or to contact the Council. It costs a massive £82,000 of taxpayer's money each year to keep the office open.

The quickest and easiest way to pay council tax bills is by Direct Debit, which can be set up online on West Devon Borough Council's website. Customers who still wish to pay by cash or cheque can use any PayPoint or Post Office around the Borough by simply taking their bill and paying over the counter.

Cllr Caroline Mott, Lead Member for Customer First at West

Devon Borough Council, said: "As more and more customers move to online payments, it was perhaps inevitable that we would need fewer offices. The money saved by closing Okehampton can be spent keeping other vital services running throughout the Borough. Of course, some people will prefer face-to-face help, and we understand this, so we will be making our Locality Officers available twice a week at the Ockment Centre to help any residents who need support."

The Locality Officers will be available every Tuesday and Friday at the Ockment Centre, from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. beginning on Tuesday 10th April and Friday 13th April.

By closing the Okehampton Office and moving to a cashless system from the beginning of April, West Devon Borough Council will save a total of nearly £125,000 of taxpayer's money each year.

Once you have registered and logged in, you will see your own information, including what payment method you are currently using, when your next payment is due and how much is owing. You can see your payment history and apply for

discounts, benefits or exemptions. There's also a handy list of Frequently Asked Questions to sort out the most common issues.

"However, we know that a lot of our residents may be a bit nervous of the online system, so we're providing these drop in sessions for anyone who would like a bit of support to get started.

"If you know anyone who would benefit from a quick introduction to the system from one of our officers, do please let them know about these sessions. All they need to do is turn up, with their tablet, mobile phone or laptop and their Council tax account number and we will help them to get set up"
