Northlew and Ashbury Produce and Craft Show 8th September

The Show includes many categories appealing to a wide range of adults and children. Last year, there were many entries for the fruit and vegetable categories and the baked goods and preserves section was hotly contested! There were, however, very few entries for the floral art categories - so this could be your chance to shine. If you would like to have a go at creating a small display, you may like to begin thinking about 'a floral arrangement in a teacup'



The flowers and greenery do not need to be home grown - they can be bought or sourced elsewhere. Let your imagination go and create a riot of bright colour to match a bright teacup, a red rose display to complement a rose decorated cup or perhaps a very subtle pastel arrangement. The choice is yours.

You may prefer to try your hand at a larger arrangement commemorating the end of World War One entitled simply 'Peace'. We're looking forward to seeing some serene displays in this category.

The final floral challenge this year is a hot topic very dear to many hearts and involves recycling. Design your own floral arrangement in or on any recycled or unusual container. Have you got an old gardening boot, a watering can, a battered saucepan, plastic guttering or other item that can be reused as part of a display that would be interesting, dramatic or simply fun? Have a look around for something recycled or unusual and begin to plan your arrangement now.

Next month we will be thinking about the new Photography Section in the Show (no longer part of the craft section), so get your thinking hat on. Here's a clue - one of the categories involves 'Movement'.

News from the Judges

The judges for this year's show have now been confirmed, and the judge for the newly created Beverages Section has agreed to share some helpful hints about the things he is looking for when tasting on the day.

We look forward to seeing entries for the 'Beer' category for the first time this year, as last year's new category of 'Cider' was hotly contested.

33 Sloe Gin: A good red colour preferred over merely pink; this usually indicates that the sloes have been well steeped. Clear and not overpoweringly sweet, but warming and rich.

34 Liqueur: Should reflect the base ingredient(s). Not too syrupy or be dominated by a spirit alcohol. Something delicious to enjoy after a good meal.

35 Cider: Lively and refreshing but not too acidic or astringent; 'bitter-sweet' is the ideal. Cloudy is fine but not chewy!

36 Beer: A good balance between malt and hops but any type (pale, brown etc), that can be consumed with relish. Should be clear and have a lively bead (natural bubbles).

37 Wine: The flavour of its main ingredient should show through

but without being over-powering or cordial-like. Neither too acidic nor sweet and a pleasing fresh or tangy finish.

38 Non-alcoholic fruit drink:

Fruity obviously, and reflect the base fruit. Not musty tasting and not overly sweet.

There is still plenty of time to start brewing or fermenting - just think of the fun you will have sampling the finished products!

Gardening Tips for the month

This is the month when you can literally see things really beginning to grow, to shoot up,

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and start to flower. It is the freshness of the foliage that is so exhilarating. Enjoy it.

There are so many jobs that need to be done now, including the tyranny of grass mowing, but if you can, try and also tackle tasks that will improve your displays for next year....

Dead heading daffodils

To that end make sure that you dead-head daffs. A really satisfying way of doing this if you have large drifts is to get a bamboo cane and a small child and get them to hit the heads off with a scythe-like action. Yes it's child labour but great free halfterm entertainment for them. Point out to small child only to hit flowers that have died.....and only in YOUR garden. Seriously though, overgrown clumps of daffs should be lifted, divided and re-planted to revitalise them.

Sowing for next year

Try and sow a row of wall flowers or Sweet Williams ready for next year's late Spring display. And a little plea for them – these are fabulous under-rated plants that do best in poor welldrained ground in the sun. Don't feed them and make sure they are planted reasonably close to one another for support, otherwise they tend to become leggy and fall over.

Potatoes and broad beans

Earth up potatoes....and also the stems of broad beans to stop them flopping about. When they get to full height pinch out the tops of your broad beans to prevent an infestation of black fly. Try these steamed and dressed with melted butter, a little lemon juice and sea salt. A word of warning, they might not be as nice if the black fly have already arrived!

Grapevine

If you have a grapevine that has developing fruit trusses on it and they have a new stem and leaves growing beyond that fruit truss, then cut back to just two pairs of leaves beyond the truss. The reason? You want the vine's energy to go into the developing fruit, not new growth. Plus, any new growth would shade the fruit which needs the sun to ripen and it encourages more air circulation around the grapes, helping to stop mould taking hold in wet periods.

Strawberries

Another fruit that suffers from mould is the strawberry. Put a thick layer of straw around the strawberry plants and under the developing fruit trusses to keep them clear of the ground and slugs. This does however mean that the strawberries are on show to every bird for miles around. Mice adore them too. A safer way of growing them than in the soil is in pots.

Sowing tender veg

Tender veg such as marrow, courgettes and sweetcorn can be sown in a greenhouse towards the end of the month if the weather is warm.

Pinching dahlias

Keep pinching out the side branches and top stems of your dahlias to get lots more flowers over the summer. They can be planted out at the end of the month.

Pruning

Early flowering clematis such as alpinas, macropetala, cirrhosa and armandii can be pruned back now. They only need overcrowded or dead stems removing.

Half hardy bedding plants

Your half-hardy bedding plants can be either planted in hanging baskets or troughs, or into the borders at the end of the month once the danger of frost has passed. Try to restrain yourself from planting out too early and make sure all the plants are properly hardened off first. Remember to put in slowrelease granular fertiliser and some water-retaining granules into the compost before planting - this and regular dead-heading will really prolong the display all summer.

And finally if you have any time left, spend it on weeding...I'm off to find a bamboo cane.

Helping women farmers in Zambia -

I've been given an opportunity to go to Zambia in July 2019 and volunteer for an agricultural pilot project. The charity is called the Natural Agriculture Development Program Zambia (NADPZ). Its aim is to improve the household status and income of rural women farmers with environmentally friendly farming methods which are costeffective. In turn, this will improve health and nutrition and reduce poverty in rural areas. In August 2015, the NADPZ built and opened a small community school for the children in the rural area. With financial support, one classroom was equipped with desks, chairs, books, posters, stationary, and equipment and 30 children, aged 4-5 were enrolled in the school. We will be working on the project and in the newly built school whilst in Zambia

Once we arrive in Lusaka, we'll visit Government schools, International schools, orphanages and hospitals. Our plan is to travel to the Pemba School and help with painting, tree planting and participate in

the school activities. Also, we'll help with potato garden preparation with the Women Farmers.

Obviously, this costs a lot of money and as a group we are fundraising within school. We can also fundraise individually for our own flights and accommodation. Over the next year I am putting on a series of events, I hope the people within our community will support me and attend. The first event is a roast lunch on Sunday 9th September 2018, cooked by my Mum and our friends. Please watch Northlew News for more details over the coming months.

Northlew Nature Watch

After a very changeable spring so far, May should signal the time when all UK wildlife really gets into gear.

Our winter migrant birds have now all returned to their northern breeding grounds, and the summer visitors have arrived from the south. The first to arrive, chiffchaffs, willow warblers, wheatear, and blackcaps amongst them, will already having started nesting. Later arrivals like house martins, swallows and swifts will start to pair up this month and explore their nesting sites. Of the summer migrants, the cuckoo has to be the true sign of spring. Sadly, the unmistakable call of the cuckoo is no longer a common sound in our countryside, but fortunately there are still many places on and around Dartmoor where they can be heard. For those who put bird-boxes up in their gardens, hopefully there should be plenty of comings and goings from the likes of blue tits, great tits, and house sparrows. Try to resist the temptation to look inside the box. as this could cause the parent birds to desert the nest.

All this bird activity is down to one thing, plenty of insects. Caterpillars are the staple diet of many of the small birds, and flying insects are taken on the wing by swifts, swallows and martins. It's amazing to think that swifts will leave the nest as young fledglings and will remain on the wing for the next 4 years before they breed themselves. They eat, sleep, and even mate on the wing.

All these insects would not be around without the profusion of flora this month. All our deciduous trees are now in leaf. great food for many species of caterpillar, and wildflowers are full of nectar rich flowers. Those to look for this month are cuckoo flower, which are an important plant for the orange tip butterfly to lay their eggs on and of course bluebells There is literally nowhere else in the world where you will see a better display of these flowers in our woodlands.

Devon is a good place to spot slow worms and they should now be breeding. Of course, they are neither slow nor worms. They are legless lizards, and being cold blooded, can sometimes be seen basking in the sunshine to warm up. On sunny days, many species of butterfly will be on the wing, as well as dragon and damsel flies. Look out for silver washed fritillary butterfly and the beautiful demoiselle damselfly, both common around these parts.



Exercise of the month: Upper back stretch -



If you spend a lot of time at the desk, in the car or sat down for long periods of time, you will more than likely suffer with stiffness of the upper back. 


