Telephone Scams – Beware!

Recently a parishioner was made very upset by phone calls from a withheld number asking for someone of another name. The caller's accent sounded to be from the Indian sub-continent. Usually she just put the phone down to end the call but, after several months, she became angry and spoke to the caller, asking him to stop calling. He then spun her a lie, stating he was investigating tax evasion and that she was in danger of being arrested. At this point, she came to us for help.

Her phone contract was with BT. I discovered that they have two free extra features that should deal with this type of nuisance call.

Call Privacy makes sure you are registered with the Telephone Preference Service, which is used by call marketing people to know not to call your number.

Call Protect blocks certain calls and sends them straight to a junk voicemail service. Blocked calls can include:

- Calls from numbers on a BT blacklist of known nuisance callers

- Calls from numbers that you put on your own blacklist
- Calls from international numbers
- Calls from withheld numbers
- Calls from unrecognised numbers

The types of call to block can be selected by the user. So, suppose you have relatives that call you from abroad, then you would not choose to block international numbers. Also, if you expect to be called by a doctor or a hospital, they will often use a withheld number. If you need to listen to these calls in the junk voicemail, you can do so by dialling 1572. With these two extras set up on her contract, the calls should stop. She was also given advice by the police to tell any nuisance caller that the police have been notified and that calls to her number are being traced.

These scams can be very distressing, especially for someone living alone.

International Restart Heart Day



Kate Hawkins ran a fantastic two hour training session on cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and defibrillator use on Tuesday 16th October as part of the International Restart Heart Day initiative. She had also been into the primary school earlier in the day to teach the children about CPR too. The training session was well attended and everyone learned a lot.

The key messages of the training are summarized below:

When someone suffers an out of hospital cardiac arrest, if certain things happen in a certain order, their chances of survival are hugely increased. This concept is known as the 'Chain of Survival'.

THE CHAIN OF SURVIVAL



The Chain of Survival is made up of four links, the first three of which can be performed by members of the public who have learnt basic life saving.

1. **Early access and recognition:** being able to recognise someone is in cardiac arrest and getting assistance is the first step to helping them.
2. **Early CPR:** performing chest compressions can keep their heart going until a defibrillator arrives. Research has shown that CPR can double a person's chances of survival.
3. **Early defibrillation:** for every minute the patient doesn't have a defibrillator attached to their chest, their chances of survival reduce by 10%. We now know that early defibrillation can triple a person's chances of survival.
4. **Early advanced care:** delivered by the Paramedics who arrive shortly after. If you start CPR within 2 minutes,

place a defibrillator on their chest in four minutes and a paramedic arrives in 8, they have a 40% chance of survival.

Gardening tips for the month

Storm Callum – staking plants

Storm Callum seems to have put paid to what was promising to be a spectacular autumn foliage display. Here on the Cornish coast we don't have many leaves left! Who knows what November will bring.....somehow I'm doubting the hoped for Indian summer.

A lot of trees, shrubs and tall perennials will have taken a battering in the recent storm. To protect them from further bad weather, stake if necessary as windrock can tear roots and kill a woody plant . Make sure to stake on the side of the tree that receives the most wind so that the trunk bends away from the stake and doesn't rub on it, when the wind blows. Tie the tree in low to

the stake rather than halfway up. This encourages the trunk to thicken but keeps the roots stable. If you can drive the stake in at an angle, so much the better.

Winter gardens for birds and insects

If you have tall perennials in a sheltered area that are still standing well, consider leaving them up over winter as they provide shelter for insects and can look very striking on a frosty morning.

Whilst on the subject of leaving plants standing, can I put a plea in for people to leave ivy flowers and berries untrimmed until Spring. These are a valuable source of food for birds and insects, especially bees. Ivy comes in two forms - juvenile and adult. It's the older adult ivy that grows away from its supporting structure on thick stems, which bear the flowers and berries. On the occasional warm day in the middle of winter, bees will forage and sometimes ivy is the only available food source for them. So..be nice..put away the shears and feed the bees.

Garden tasks specific to November.

Tulip bulbs should be planted towards the end of the month, to

help avoid tulip virus, which causes stunted yellow streaked foliage. Plants such as dahlias and cannas can be cut down and lifted for storing till spring, once frost has blackened the foliage. You can over-winter them in the ground, but you need to be vigilant about protecting them from slugs when new growth emerges next spring. It's worth mulching them now to protect the tubers from cold too.

Cleaning your greenhouse

One of the most mundane, but valuable tasks at this time, is cleaning the greenhouse. Using a mild solution of bleach or greenhouse cleaner, scrub the glass and all the crevices in the frames, to get rid of algae and hibernating whitefly. A plastic plant label can sometimes be used..(with extreme care!) to clean between the overlapping glass. It's a boring job, but worth it in terms of increased light levels for next season.

At the end of the gardening year, it's worth visiting places such as RHS Rosemoor to see how they continue to have interest in the garden through the whole winter. They have fantastic colour even now, using trees and shrubs with coloured bark such as Cornus,

snake bark maples and birches and tall grasses such as Miscanthus.

Some of these can be adapted for smaller gardens too.

Despite the promise of great weather, our group for this walk was much diminished from our usual number of walkers. As a result, we decided to transport everyone to Dartmoor and enjoy the great views and walking to be had there.



Joining us on the walk this month were Pat Carter, Shirley Brookman and myself from Northlew along with Susan Jones, Shirley Lloyd, Brigid Richardson and Steve and Diane Hargreaves from further afield.

Having picked up Shirley Brookman and Pat Carter, we met up with the others at Meldon Quarry for the start of the walk. With the weather improving by the minute we set off up the track towards Meldon Reservoir and the dam. Looking back down the valley, we had great views of the viaduct, now used by pedestrians and cyclist as part of the Granite Way. A far cry from the days of steam trains which carried people and goods to and from Plymouth.

After crossing the dam, we stopped to admire all the Dartmoor ponies with their foals just before the car park, one of which was proving to

be particularly feisty despite his size. Continuing along the lane, we reached the bridge where the Granite Way crossed the road.

Climbing up onto the disused railway track, we walked over the viaduct, at which point we stopped for the photoshoot. From here, we took the footpath down by the side of the viaduct, to bring us out onto the approach road to the quarry. Taking the path on the right, we walked through woodland and gorse, to bring us back up to the car park, and the end of the walk.

You would be forgiven for thinking that all the fun was over, but no, we then went on to enjoy well earned 'refreshments' at Betty Cottles.

Northlew Nature Watch

By now our migrant birds from Scandinavia and further north will have already settled in to enjoy the relatively mild climate of the UK.

Among them will be Fieldfare,



Redwing,
Waxwing and
Brambling.

The great thing about these birds is that they will happily visit our gardens,

particularly if we provide their preferred food.

Included among their favourites are the berries from Rowan (Mountain Ash), Hawthorn, Ivy and Holly.

Rosehips are also enjoyed by Thrushes, particularly the smaller ones, which the birds can pick and swallow whole.

They will also take Crab Apples, and if the weather gets really cold, will feast on windfall apples, preferably cut in half, and laid on the lawn.



A lot of supermarkets plant Rowan trees around their car parks, and so if we get a 'good' Waxwing year,

then this is a good place to look. For unknown reasons, Waxwings will allow you to get really close to them before they fly away, so good views are really possible.

This is a good time to spot some of our woodland birds, as our deciduous trees will have dropped most of their leaves, and so they will be easier to spot. Take a little time to sit quietly in your local woodland and you should be rewarded with sightings of Great Spotted Woodpecker, Treecreeper, or Nuthatch, all resident birds, looking to feed up before winter sets in.

Any woodland walk will also deliver some great fungi at this time, but please be careful if you handle any, as they could be poisonous.



One of the most spectacular is the classic Fly Agaric, with its beautiful red

cap splashed with white flakes.

So, wrap up warm, and get out there, nature doesn't stop delivering, even in November.

2. The organiser is a parishioner.
3. All profit to go to the named charity.
4. It must be a public event open to all. This offer is not for private functions.
5. The £10 covers the hall and use of the kitchen for drinks only. If food preparation and serving is required then an additional £15 is essential to cover our extra costs. Any event must meet all 5 criteria to be granted the booking price of £10.

Recipe of the month

Chocolate Guinness Cake with peanut butter frosting

Ingredients

250ml Guinness
225g butter chopped
75g cocoa
2 eggs
160g sour cream
300g plain flour, sifted
1 1/2 teaspoons bicarbonate of soda
440g caster sugar

Frosting:

160g icing sugar
280g smooth peanut butter
80g butter, softened
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
80ml single cream

Method

Preheat the oven to 160°C. Place the Guinness and butter in a saucepan over a medium heat and stir to dissolve the butter. Remove from heat and whisk in the cocoa. Set aside.
Whisk together the eggs and sour cream. Add to the stout mixture with the flour, bicarbonate of soda and sugar and whisk to combine.

Pour into a lightly greased 21cm x 10cm x 7cm loaf tin lined with non stick baking paper. Bake for 1 hour 20 minutes or until cooked when tested with a skewer. Allow to cool in the tin for 10 minutes. Turn out onto a wire rack to cool completely.

To make the peanut butter frosting, place the sugar, peanut butter, butter and vanilla in an electric blender and mix for 6 minutes or until light and fluffy. Add the cream and beat for a further 2 minutes. Spread the frosting over the cake to serve. Serves 6-8.

Bus Routes from Northlew



Every Monday, Thursday and Saturday there is a morning service to Okehampton. The bus will be parked for 2-3 hours outside Waitrose where you can leave your shopping whilst you visit Okehampton. Or if you prefer there is also a service to Bideford which is convenient for Morrisons.



Also, by arrangement, services to Crediton (Tuesdays) Newton Abbot (Wednesdays) and Exeter (Fridays) and in school holidays Barnstaple (Tuesdays) Holsworthy (Wednesdays) Tavistock (Fridays) are available from Northlew.

These services mainly use scenic routes ideal for showing off the area to friends that may be visiting. Bus passes are accepted at all times and if you are not lucky enough to have one then the fares are low. Let the bus take the strain out of driving and no parking charges to pay or spaces to find!
