## Arabia to Princetown via Northlew – by Colin Jarvis

# Another grandfather, prisoners, death and loose ends.

#### Princetown

Princetown was developed and named by a very enthusiastic man when he built his home at Tor Royal about 130 years before the First World War. This was one of the achievements of a Sir Thomas Tyrwhitt! The name for the hamlet was to honour the Prince of Wales of that period. Thomas had high hopes for the area including trying to tame the local moorland to grow crops that may not have exactly been suitable. He may have failed at the wheat growing plan but he created Dartmoor Prison and built several roads on the moor. He also became Member of Parliament for Okehampton. Some road schemes may not have been completed and many roads and tracks needed improving including the track alongside Tor Royal Stud farm and across to farms in the moor What was to happen in 1916 and 1917 regarding the roads and tracks would have pleased locals and Arthur Hurn who was busy breeding new horses from stallions including Eliza's Dwarka at Tor Royal.

### Family connection

By strange coincidence my grandfather, Walter, [father's side] was sent to Dartmoor Prison in or around 1916! It wasn't until I was 15 that my father divulged this family secret. Walter was a member of a strict and fairly extreme religious sect even at the age of 17! He was called up to fight in the Great War along with 15 more young men from the sect. They refused to take up arms and were prepared to face a firing squad so I was told. He and his friends were going to uphold the commandment to the last letter..... Thou Shalt not kill. They became some of the early conscientious objectors and eventually the authorities decided to put Walter and the others into Dartmoor Prison, As I have mentioned some of the tracks around Princetown, notably alongside Tor Royal, needed rebuilding or extending. My grandfather was a strong man and loved the outdoors and I could imagine him joining the hard work parties to do this work involving rock breaking in a quarry and laying out tracks. This would have been far better than being indoors or

solitary confinement! Who knows...he may have seen the horses in the adjoining fields and the stud manager Arthur Hurn busy at work in, or around, 1917/18.

#### Conchie Road

The track in question is now named Conchie Road and was given a plaque last year to remember its history. My grandfather never talked about this episode in his life. Tor Royal is tucked away about half a mile south east from Princetown and offers Bed and Breakfast and a wedding venue. Why not stay in the Wallace Room with its appropriate king size bed?

### After the war

Three years after the war in 1921, the stud decided Dwarka should be put down by one of the vets. He was a good age at 29 years and no doubt Eliza was fully informed. Because of his history of achievements, Prince Edward let the Natural History Museum in London have his body for educational and scientific purposes and apparently is still there in the mammal research section. All there except his front hooves....Edward sent these from the taxidermist down to Devon for Eliza as a

keepsake; Dwarka, her amazing stallion.

#### Northlew

There has been speculation as to why Eliza came to Northlew but it could be because of a friend, the veterinary surgeon William MacDougall who was working with the cavalry in India when Eliza lived there. He saved countless horses from death from war injuries in France and Belgium during World War I.

I understand that MacDougall may have lived next door to here at Morth Grange so when our cottage became empty Eliza moved in. Eliza had entrusted the vet to bring Dwarka to the UK in 1901. There is one elderly resident of Northlew old enough to have met Eliza here in our cottage over 80 years ago...Les Friend from Wadland. He also remembers her riding side saddle around the village. Most records show that for a period our cottage was called Morth Grange Cottage but most Northlew residents know it as Cary Cottage. Eliza's mother's maiden name was....Cary! Eliza may have changed the name towards the end of her stay here late 1920s/early 1930s so as to remember her mother. The name changed again between 2006 and

2012 to Little Acorns by the owners previous to us but to maintain the connection we intend to name a small woodland we have planted here Cary Copse.

#### Additional research

From research done by a friend, Paul Callan, we found out that Eliza moved to Tedburn St Mary near to Exeter and passed away in 1941. She was born in India 1864. Because Paul discovered records of Eliza we were able to discover what is in a name! He found out that our cottage like so many older houses has been home to many residents....all will have a story to tell! Thank you Paul.

### Thank you

# Gardening tips for the month



#### Wind burn

Hopefully May won't see a repeat of the cold winds that caused damage to young leaf growth in mid April. The new growth, brought out early by balmy weather earlier in the month, wasn't toughened up sufficiently to resist wind burn. Most trees and shrubs should recover well though.

### Bedding plants

This is always a tricky time, judging when or if to put out bedding plants. The safest rule of thumb is to put them outside on warm days and bring them back under cover at night for a couple of weeks until they are properly hardened off. When the last danger of frost has passed - usually at the end of the month, then they can stay outside permanently.

### Weeding

Keep weeding everywhere, especially keeping on top of 'ephemeral' weeds such as groundsel, Fat Hen and hairy bittercress. The latter is the small white flowered job, whose seed pods when ripe, will literally explode when touched...... sending seeds into unwary eyes. It is a wretched nuisance and will go from flowering to ripe seeds in just a couple of weeks during hot weather. There can be 2 or 3 generations of these little sweeties per season...so if you weed out the first lot, you can reduce subsequent numbers hugely. Thankfully they are easy to pull out or hoe off!

### Miscellaneous jobs

Other jobs can include earthing up potatoes, especially second earlies and maincrops. You can also lift, divide and replant any clumps of daffodils that you want to increase or that have failed to flower well.

### The 'Chelsea chop'

A job you could consider doing if you have tall herbaceous perennials that flop over when flowering, such as Shasta daisies, heleniums, sedums and phlox - you can give them a 'Chelsea Chop'. This basically involves cutting back the plants to about two thirds of their

height in late May (around the time of the Chelsea Flower show). Yes, you do lose the first flush of flowers, but you end up with sturdier plants that need little staking, plus more albeit smaller flowers. It also prolongs the flowering display, especially if you cut some plants back and leave others unpruned so that they flower earlier.

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# Nature Watch: a year in the life of a pond - April

### **Frogs**

I am pleased to report that I still have live tadpoles in my pond, despite the recent frosts. Luckily we have only had light frosts, and the lovely daytime sunshine has soon warmed things up. No sign of legs yet, but they are certainly growing. I am pretty sure they are frog tadpoles, as they hatched from a large clump of spawn. Toads tend to lay their eggs in long strands, and newts lay single eggs, attached to the vegetation. Strangely, the other day I spotted a half size frog in amongst the vegetation. It can't have been one of this year's

hatchlings, but if it had been last year's, why was it not fully grown? Any ideas anyone?

### Green algae

I am starting to get a lot of a slimy green growth on the surface of the pond, and amongst the vegetation. I am concerned that this may be reducing the oxygen levels in the water, and ultimately may cause the tadpoles and other wildlife in the pond to die.

According to RHS these are the possible causes :

- The pond is getting too much direct sunlight
- Too little vegetation to provide shade
- A build up of organic matter at the bottom of the pond, possibly due to fallen leaves in Autumn.
- Fertiliser leaching into the pond
- Using tap water to top up the pond

So, what can be done to reduce the problem?

- Continue to fish it out.
- Float a straw bale on the pond, or for small ponds add a 'straw extract' liquid

- Do not change the water, as it may come back even worse when you re-fill the pond
- Add a pond dye, to reduce the effect of ultra violet rays from the sun
- Ultrasound. This works by shaking apart the cells of the algae. It will be expensive, but might be worth a try.
- Add a waterfall or fountain, to improve water aeration.
- Add a pond filter

Add goldfish, but not carp or tench, as they stir up the bottom, making the water cloudy. If you want frogs, and invertebrates, don't add fish.

Add Ramshorn snails. Avoid other snails, as they may eat your plants

### Other wildlife

I am starting to see pond skaters (family name Gerridae) on the surface of the pond, living up to their names. They are also called Jesus bugs for obvious reasons. They have hairs on their legs, whereby they use the effect of surface tension to 'walk on water'. They spend their lives skimming along on the water's surface

looking for small bugs either on the surface or just under the surface to feed on. According to Wikipedia there are at least 1700 different species of these creatures.

# Marathon walk for charity.

It's a whopper this year at a rough total distance of 31.5 miles, starting in Barnstable and following the Tarka trail along the coast to Bideford before heading in-land to Torrington and beyond. Remember you don't have to do the whole thing, we'll organise meet points along the way so any distance can be catered for. Nearer the time we'll have firmed up transport to get us to the start point, Barnstable station. You know you want to, get training!
