

6th June 2019: the 75th Anniversary of D-Day

The 75th anniversary of the D-Day landings in Normandy will be observed this month. While many of us will know something about this historic event from films or books, the following shortened abstracts from '10 things you need to know about D-Day' (from the Imperial War Museum (https://www.iwm.org.uk/history/the-10-things-you-need-to-know-about-dday) may be of interest.

1. D-Day was the start of Operation Overlord

On D-Day, 6th June 1944, Allied forces launched a combined naval. air and land assault on Nazioccupied France. Codenamed Operation 'Overlord', the Allied landings on the Normandy beaches marked the start of a long and costly campaign to liberate northwest Europe from German occupation. Early on 6th June, Allied airborne forces parachuted into drop zones across northern France. Ground troops then landed across five assault beaches: Utah, Omaha, Gold, Juno and Sword. By the end of the day, the Allies had established a foothold along the coast and could begin their advance into France.

2. Overlord opened the second front against Germany The defeat of Germany was acknowledged as the western Allies' principal war aim as early as December 1941. Opening a second front would relieve pressure on the Soviet Union in the east and the liberation of France would weaken Germany's overall position in western Europe.

3. D-Day required detailed planning

A command team led by American General Dwight D. Eisenhower was formed in December 1943 to plan the naval, air and land operations. To build up resources for the invasion. British factories increased production and in the first half of 1944 approximately 9 million tonnes of supplies and equipment crossed the Atlantic from North America to Britain. A substantial Canadian force had been building up in Britain since December 1939 and over 1.4 million American servicemen arrived during 1943 and 1944 to take part in the landings.

4. D-Day was an international effort

D-Day required unprecedented cooperation between international armed forces. By 1944, over 2 million troops from over 12 countries were in Britain in preparation for the invasion. On D-Day, Allied forces consisted primarily of American, British and Canadian troops but also included Australian, Belgian, Czech, Dutch, French, Greek, New Zealand, Norwegian, Rhodesian and Polish naval, air or ground support.

5. The largest naval, air and land operation in history

The invasion was conducted in two main phases – an airborne assault and amphibious landings. Shortly after midnight on 6th June, over 18,000 Allied paratroopers were dropped into the invasion area to provide tactical support for infantry divisions on the beaches. Allied air forces flew over 14.000 sorties in support of the landings and, having secured air supremacy prior to the invasion, many of these flights were unchallenged by the Luftwaffe. Nearly 7,000 naval vessels, including battleships, destroyers, minesweepers, escorts and assault craft took part in Operation Neptune, the naval component of 'Overlord'. Naval forces were responsible for escorting and landing over 132,000 ground troops on the beaches.

6. German defences in Normandy varied in effectiveness

Germany tried to defend the northern coast of France with a series of fortifications known as the 'Atlantic Wall'. The Allied deception campaigns succeeded in convincing the Germans as late as July 1944 that the main invasion force would still land elsewhere. The threat of this larger, second invasion kept German reinforcements tied down away from Normandy. However, the Allies faced a number of setbacks both on 6th June and in the months that followed. On D-Day, the Americans came close to defeat on Omaha partially because the preliminary air and naval bombardment failed to knock out strong defence points, but also because they faced highly effective German troops who had gained hard-earned experience on the Fastern Front.

7. D-Day was possible because of Allied efforts elsewhere

In planning D-Day, Allied commanders drew important lessons from previous failures at Dieppe in France and Anzio in Italy. The Allied strategic bombing campaign, which began in 1942, weakened German industry and forced Germany to commit manpower and resources away from Normandy to home defence. Securing air superiority allowed the Allies to carry out aerial reconnaissance, giving them vital intelligence on German coastal defences. D-Day also depended on Allied control of the Atlantic. which was finally achieved in 1943 through victory in the Battle of the Atlantic. Ten weeks after D-Day, the Allies launched a second invasion on the southern coast of France and began a simultaneous advance towards Germany.

8. There is more to Normandy than D-Day

The importance of D-Day often overshadows the overall significance of the entire Normandy campaign. In the three months after D-Day, the Allies launched a series of additional offensives to try and advance further inland. These operations varied in success and the Allies faced strong and determined German resistance. Yet the bloody and protracted Battle of Normandy was a decisive victory for the Allies and paved the way for the liberation of much of northwest Europe.

9. North-west Europe was the most significant campaign fought by the Western Allies 'Overlord' did not bring an end to the war in Europe, but it did begin the process through which victory was eventually achieved. By the end of August 1944, the German Army was in full retreat from France, but by September Allied momentum had slowed. The Germans were able to regroup and launched a failed but determined counteroffensive in the Ardennes in December 1944. This defeat sapped German manpower and resources and allowed the Allies to resume their advance towards Germany.

10. There were many 'D-Days' throughout the war

'D-Day' is a general term for the start date of any military operation - the 'D' stands for 'day'. It is often used when the exact date is either secret or not yet known. Some people thought soldiers serving in Italy were avoiding 'real combat' in France and called them 'D-Day Dodgers'. But troops in Italy had faced their own D-Days at Sicily, Salerno, and Anzio and were engaged in a dangerous and difficult advance up the Italian peninsula.

Northlew and Ashbury Produce and Craft Show 2019 Saturday 7th September

The bank holiday weekend has provided some superb weather and light for brilliant photographs, so this seems a good time to flag up the new categories for the Photography Classes in this year's show.

All of the photographs should be unframed, with a maximum size of 22.5 x 15cm. All categories can be in either black and white or colour. Entrants can submit a maximum of two entries for each class, so a total maximum of eight photographs.

This year the categories are quite broad and therefore allow photographers to use their imagination and creativity to interpret these in their own way.

Northlew architecture

Firstly, we would like you to capture an aspect of 'Northlew architecture'. With so many superb historical buildings around, there is something to inspire everybody or perhaps you will decide to photograph some modern building work around the village.

Still life

The second category is the classic 'Still Life' - feel free to recreate the composition of an old master, or design something more contemporary to photograph glassware, wine bottles, flowers, fruit or a selection of themed natural objects can all feature in this class.

Water and animals

The third and fourth photography categories are 'Water' and 'Animal' - offering photographers opportunities to share their favourite photos from aspects of the natural world. Will it be the sea, a babbling brook, a magnificent waterfall or driving rain? The animal could be a domestic pet, a farm animal or something captured in the wild by a lens - the choice is yours.

So, while you are out and about, walking around our picturesque local countryside or further afield, don't forget to get snapping!

Finally, here are some notes from this year's judge about the beverages section of the show these should be helpful for this very well supported element of the show!

Tasting notes

33 Sloe Gin: A good red colour preferred over merely pink; this usually indicates that the sloes have been well steeped. Clear and not overpoweringly sweet, but warming and rich.

34 Liqueur: Should reflect the base ingredient(s). Not too syrupy or be dominated by a spirit alcohol. Something delicious to enjoy after a good meal.

35 Cider: Lively and refreshing but not too acidic or astringent; 'bitter-sweet' is the ideal. Cloudy is fine but not chewy!

36 Beer: A good balance between malt and hops but any type (pale, brown etc), that can be consumed with relish. Should be clear and have a lively bead (natural bubbles).

37 Wine: The flavour of its main ingredient should show through but without being over-powering or cordial-like. Neither too acidic nor sweet and a pleasing fresh or tangy finish.

38 Non-alcoholic fruit drink: Fruity obviously, and reflect the base fruit. Not musty tasting and not overly sweet.

Nature Watch: a year in the life of a pond - April

Frogs

I still have tadpoles, but from what I can see, no legs yet. There are changes though, as they are starting to look more frog shaped, and changing colour from black to greeny/brown. No idea what they are eating, but there is a lot less algae in the pond (see last month), so maybe they are eating that. I believe at some point they turn from eating vegetation to become carnivores. Hopefully they will find enough food in the pond, as I have heard that they can start to eat each other!!

Green algae

As stated above, there is a lot less algae, either down to being fished out at regular intervals, or being eaten by the tadpoles. Either way, the pond water is looking nice and clear, and the plants are growing well.

Other wildlife

Still plenty of Pond Skimmers, skating around, but now also seeing Damselflies landing on the pond plants.



Damselflies belong to the Zygoptera suborder, which means "paired

wings", and there are 20 species to look out for in the UK.



Unlike Dragonflies, when they land, they usually fold

their wings into their sides. The ones you are likely to see around your pond at this time are Beautiful Demoiselle, Banded Demoiselle, Large Red, and one or more of the Blues. They will have spent around a year as a nymph in the pond before crawling up a pond plant, out of the water, to hatch out into their adult form. After a couple of weeks flying around, they will have gained there full breeding colours. Their only goal in life then is to find a mate, and breed. Once mated, the female will lay her eggs on a pond plant, just under the surface, and the whole life cycle will start again. Once breeding is over, the adults have completed their purpose and will die soon after. In the adult stage, a Damselfly may only live a few weeks

Geoffrey Harley Douglas Woollcombe was born on 7th November 1898 at Cranmere. Newton Abbot and was a second cousin to the Ashbury branch of the Woollcombe family. He was well known to the Woollcombe family and would have worshipped in this church. His father worked as a solicitor in Newton Abbot, From what we know he enjoyed country pursuits. On leaving school with the First World War raging he joined the second battalion 2nd King Edward Seventh's Own Gurkha Rifles in India to where they had recently returned from the trenches of the western front where they had suffered very heavy casualties especially in British Officers. With them he was quickly involved in fighting on the North West frontier and in repelling the 1919 Afghan invasion of India. After the end of WWI he remained with 2/2GR and in January 1941 assumed command of them training for desert warfare prior to joining the British desert

army fighting Rommel in the Libyan desert.

Although the RAF had won the Battle of Britain in 1940 thus reducing the chance of Nazi Invasion 1941 was a critical one for Britain. Nightly heavy bomber raids were destroying large areas of London, Coventry, Bristol, Plymouth, Exeter and other major cities. U-boat sinkings of vital Atlantic convoys were threatening the ability of Britain to fight on and the attempt to assist Greece in resisting Nazi invasion failed with heavy losses in men, material and naval shipping. As if this was not enough Japan showed every sign of joining the Nazis and attacking Malaya, Burma and Singapore. As a result Geoffrey Woollcombe was probably not too surprised to be told to stop training for the desert and move in August 1941 with two other Gurkha battalions to Malaya which was mainly jungle. On arrival all were surprised that so little had been done to prepare against invasion which came on 7th December with a simultaneous Japanese attack on the USA at Pearl Harbour and Malaya. The battle ships Prince of Wales and Repulse attempting to intercept the invasion convoys were assailed by swarms of Japanese dive and torpedo bombers and swiftly sunk

and obsolescent RAF fighters attempting to assist shot out of the sky. So that by the time Geoffrey Woollcombe's battalion along with the two other Gurkha battalions deployed to blocking positions on the Thai-Malayan frontier the Japanese had achieved total command of sea and air and any aircraft sighted could be reliably assumed hostile.

Despite British military planners assuming Malaya to be too heavily jungled for tanks to be any use the lapanese attacked with large numbers straight down the main road axis the Gurkhas were defending. With no heavy anti-tank guns after 48 hours desperate fighting two of the three Gurkha battalions were reduced to half their original numbers with only Geoffrey Woollcombe's 2/2GR still able to muster a coherent order of battle albeit with heavy losses. During the next month's heavy fighting Geoffrey Woollcombe's Gurkhas occupied a series of blocking positions down the main west coast route towards Singapore. Continually reinforced and with total air and sea command the Japanese relentlessly forced back the defenders who finally reached the causeway connecting Malaya and Singapore which was blown up behind them. It was at

this stage when his battalion was taking up position to defend Singapore Island that in early February 1942 he was forced to hand over command owing to ill health brought about by the stress of continual command in action manifesting itself in suppurating jungle sores.

As someone who had first hand knowledge of fighting the Japanese he was selected to join an all ranks group of specialists, engineers, intelligence, signals who were to return to India to brief GHQ on the disastrous campaign. Unfortunately, their departure was so delayed by Japanese bombing that there were no naval vessels available so they had to take harbour launches and try and get to Sumatra: still in Dutch control. Leaving his beloved 2nd Gurkhas after all they had gone through together was a hard wrench as they closed into the final defensive perimeter, blazing oil tanks covering the sky in black oily ash and the last vital water reservoir already under direct Japanese fire. Geoffrey was never to see them again. Two days after his departure they were ordered to surrender. The Japanese immediately separated Gurkhas from their British officers and initially treated them well hoping to cajole them

into joining the Japanese sponsored Indian National Army. When they refused the treatment became brutal as it had already for their British officers .

Meanwhile Geoffrey's launch had run out of fuel short of Sumatra but luckily it was discovered by a Dutch patrol boat which landed its crew and passengers on Sumatra. They then made their way to the small port of Padang where a small Dutch freighter called SS Roosboon was just getting up steam to leave; news of Japanese landings on Sumatra having been received. Some 140 embarked on SS Roosboon including nurses from Singapore; Geoffrey now too ill to walk was amongst them. 500 miles short of Ceylon (today Sri Lanka) and safety it was torpedoed by a Japanese submarine and guickly sank. There was only one lifeboat on which as many survivors as could boarded. The waters were shark infested and in the end only four people out of all on board survived. They were two Javanese seamen, a Eurasian nurse and a Lieutenant from the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. They drifted back towards Sumatra and were recaptured by the Japanese. The Javanese managed to escape, the nurse was shot and the Lieutenant finally went into the

same POW camp in Singapore as were officers of Geoffrey's old regiment 2/2GR. However it was not until the Japanese had been defeated that Major Robertson the officiating CO of 2/2GR was able to write to Violet Woollcombe to tell her how her son had died in a letter that starts with the line `lt is with the greatest regret that I have to tell you I fear there is no hope for Geoffrey.'

So, this evening family, regiment and local congregation 77 years after Geoffrey's death remember him in his family church and, in a manner, welcome him back home.

North Devon Hospice

For those who are not familiar with the work of North Devon Hospice here is some information about the incredible work it does and the support it gives to terminally ill patients and their families and loved ones.

Since starting 35 years ago in 1984... with just one community nurse....North Devon Hospice now provides specialist care at no cost to over 2,000 patients and their families each year who are facing life-limiting illnesses from across North Devon ... not just those who have cancer but other life limiting illnesses such as motor neurone disease, multiple sclerosis, heart failure, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), liver failure and renal failure. They need £6.1 million every year to provide their care and support, like most hospices, they only receive a small amount of funding from NHS Devon, last year this came in at \pounds 1.2 million but in the main, they have to rely on the support and generosity of the local community to help them fund the care. They generate the majority of their income through fundraising activities, charity shops and the

hospice lottery. Their services include community services, inpatient care in their Bedded Unit and a Supportive Care service that includes bereavement support.

The Bedded Unit

The Bedded Unit provides specialist palliative inpatient care for adults with complex problems associated with advanced progressive illnesses. This support is available to patients who have complex end of life care needs and require treatment for pain management or other distressing symptoms. They give this care 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. They offer accommodation in their seven room Bedded Unit. They have a high nurse to patient ratio, allowing them the opportunity to give dedicated support to patients with a variety of symptoms associated with a life-limiting illness. The Bedded Unit is located within the main hospice site at Deer Park in Newport, on the outskirts of Barnstaple. The Unit overlooks the hospice gardens and from most rooms there are far reaching views across the Taw Valley.

Additional support is needed

It is thanks to fundraising in the local community that they were able to open the Bedded Unit in 2005, unfortunately, at this time they are only able to open up 3 of these rooms to patients, as there is insufficient funds to employ enough nurses care for the patients in house.

Supportive Care Services

As for Supportive Care Services, this is for patients and their families, who are living with the knowledge that time might be short. The Supportive Care team offers a wide range of individual sessions and group workshops. Together with each family, including children and grandchildren, they give space and time to explore what is important to them and discuss what may support their wellbeing and quality of life. Over the years, they have found that sometimes it is easier to talk more freely to someone who is not a family member and that being with people in a similar situation can really make a difference. Individual sessions allow for confidential one to one support with counsellor trained staff. They also have a team of complementary therapists who provide a range of different therapies. They facilitate group activities and offer them in six-week programmes, they are able to vary the content of each programme to meet the specific needs of the patients and their families that they have at that time. Past programmes have included well-being days, support groups for patients, support groups for carers and people who have been bereaved, 'Making Memories' workshops, mindfulness workshops, seated exercise, gardening, information sessions on How to Talk to the Children. nutrition, coping with anxiety and breathlessness.

The Hospice itself is beautiful, the staff are amazing. It is beyond clean and the people are friendly and caring. The inhouse café provides lovely tasty food at a price that just seems to cover costs. The gardens are beautiful and well kept, the balconies look out over them, I believe these are maintained by volunteers. All in all, it's a calm and peaceful place to be and we as a community are so lucky to have such a place.
