Gardening tips for the month



Summer weather!

Well, the first 3 weeks of August was a bit of a washout. As usual though, the weather forecasters are predicting a heatwave to start just as the schools go back.....situation normal then for the West Country.

Blight loves humid weather

In this damp humid weather, keep an eye out for potato and tomato blight - entire crops can be lost if you aren't vigilant. If you spot the tell tale browning and sudden collapse of the foliage (and long blackish stains on the stems of tomatoes), strip off any affected foliage and you may be able to avert a disaster. The best way to avoid the problem is to plant blight resistant varieties of potatoes, such as the Sarpo series and don't grow potatoes and outdoor tomatoes near each other.

Remember to pinch out the

growing tips of tomato plants now, to concentrate their energies into ripening their fruit. If you have maincrop potatoes, let them dry out for a day before bagging, to prevent damp problems in storage.

Pumpkins and squashes

Pumpkins and squashes should still be on their vines and ripening nicely (hopefully). Prop each fruit up on a flat piece of wood to stop them rotting on the earth in wet weather.

Pruning

There's a fair bit of pruning that can be done from now on. Climbing roses can be tackled once they've finished flowering. Cut back sideshoots to a couple of leaf buds from the main stem. Any late flowering shrubs such as Philadelphus and helianthemum can be pruned now too - trimming off this year's flowering stems to new young wood and in the case of Philadelphus, taking out approx 25% of old stems right down to the base.

Sweet peas

Sweet peas can be sown in pots towards the end of the month and overwintered in a cold frame. Make sure that you pinch them back once they are around 6" tall, to create strong bushy growth.

Moving shrubs

Both deciduous and evergreen shrubs can be moved now and large clumps of herbaceous perennials can be lifted and divided to create new plants. The soil is still warm enough at this time of year to encourage strong root growth before winter.

Bringing plants inside

We don't tend to get early frosts in Devon, but tender perennial plants such as pelargoniums will appreciate being brought inside before cold winds and wet weather set them back.

Planting for spring

September is the perfect time to plant spring bulbs such as daffodils, hyacinths and crocus. When buying them, it's worth thinking about the scent they can provide as well as the flowers.

Varieties of narcissus that fulfil this include Cheerfullness (creamy white), Hawera (yellow, good for naturalising), Silver Chimes (white) and Geranium (white and orange). There are also the Tazetta types, grown indoors, such as Paper White, Soleil d'or and Golden Dawn. These won't survive outdoors reliably, but there are Tazetta types such as Martinette that will do well in a sheltered well drained spot.

To extend the season, try Narcissus poeticus var.recurvus (the petals curve backwards). This is one of the last narcissus to flower and one of the best for fragrance.

Crocus aren't usually associated with scent, but Blue Pearl and Cream Beauty smell lovely on a warm early Spring day. They will do well in shallow terracotta pots with the compost surface covered with horticultural grit. Then they can be placed near a doorway or window where the scent can be easily appreciated.

Protection from squirrels

If you have a squirrel problem, cover each pot with small gauge chicken wire cap cut to shape.

The Pegasus Trail

The Pegasus Trail is a newly created walking, cycling and horseriding trail which takes advantage mostly of quiet lanes and public bridleways, and will eventually link the Granite Way with the Ruby Way.



The waymarked trail takes you from Dartmoor National Park

at Meldon through West Devon and into Ruby Country, along a dismantled railway track and into Cookworthy Forest.

This latest section of the Pegasus Trail in West Devon has now opened.

Devon County Council has completed the second phase of the walking, cycling and horse-riding trail.

The new two-mile section, which opened on the 11th May, runs from Venndown Gates to Broadbury Castle Farm (near Castle Cross off the A3079).

Horse riders from South West Riders (SWR), a local group affiliated to the British Horse Society, were among the first to enjoy the new section of the trail.

Instead of cutting a ribbon, Chris Ingram, President of SWR, opened a linked dog lead and horse lead, symbolising some of the many users who will benefit from the trail. Chris has worked with Devon County Council since the original plans were discussed nearly 20 years ago. She gave an emotional speech recalling some of the difficulties encountered, but thanked the landowners, contractors and County Council staff for all they had done.

Gretta Madigan, Chair of SWR, said:

"We would like to thank Devon County Council for creating the trail, and also for their multi-use policy, which enables everyone to use it. Respect for fellow users and mutual courtesy is our motto. Indeed, one of the beauties of an off-road trail is the opportunity to stop and chat. As we walked along the trail we met a walker who said 'I am so happy' – what a wonderful accolade. Well done to all who have helped to make it happen."

The new section of the trail uses a dismantled former railway track bed to provide an off-road

connection between Bowerland Forest and Broadbury Castle Farm. It also links to the on-road section of the Pegasus Trail from Meldon.

Councillor Stuart Hughes, Devon **County Council Cabinet Member** for Highway Management, said: "This latest section of the route is a great addition to the Pegasus Trail. The established sections of the trail are extremely popular and I'm sure this new stretch will be warmly welcomed by all of the local people and groups, such as the South West Riders, who have waited patiently for this phase to be completed. We would like to thank the landowners for their cooperation and willingness to support the creation of the route across their land. Their support is key to making this project a reality."

Councillor James McInnes, Devon County Councillor for Hatherleigh and Chagford, said: "It's taken time, but I'm pleased this next section is now open. Getting horses and riders off the main road is important. It is also important to work with landowners to make sure the best solution can be found for the completion of the route."

Work is ongoing on the remaining stretches of the route to connect

the missing link between Broadbury Castle Farm and Beamsworthy.

When complete, the Trail, which uses quiet lanes and public bridleways, will form a 15 mile (25 km) link between Dartmoor National Park at Meldon and Cookworthy Forest in Ruby Country. It will also eventually link the Granite Way with the Ruby Way.

History

In 1871 the Devon and Cornwall Railway reached Okehampton, giving access to the eastern network via Exeter. In 1874 the company extended its line to Lydford to access Plymouth over the Great Western Railway (GWR) line. A third rail was laid on the broad gauge GWR line to give the standard gauge trains access. The Devon and Cornwall line was leased and operated by the London and Southern Western Railway (LSWR), but never owned by it.

On 20th January 1879 the LSWR opened a branch line to Holsworthy diverging from the Lydford line at Meldon Junction. At that time Bude was a small harbour town, and although it was proposed to extend the branch to the town, the LSWR did not consider it important enough to justify the cost A coach service operated from Holsworthy station to Bude, a distance of ten miles.

In the following 19 years, Bude became a regional centre and seaside holidays gained in importance. On 10th August 1898 the line was extended to Bude. The neighbouring inland town of Stratton was considered by its residents to be more important and therefore the station at Bude stopped short of the town centre to appease Stratton. A wharf siding line extended from near the station to the tidal harbour.

In summer 1958, seven stopping trains operated from Monday to Friday between Okehampton and Bude. The Atlantic Coast Express, a through train from Waterloo at 10:35, ran non-stop from Exeter St Davids to Halwill and called at Holsworthy arriving at Bude at 15:25.

On Sundays three trains ran each way in summer only, although before 1958 there had only been one.

The area served by the line was sparsely populated, with fewer than seven tickets a day being sold at Ashbury in 1936 and passenger numbers declined steadily, especially when private car ownership became commonplace. The line closed on 1st October 1966.

Nature Watch: a year in the life of a pond - August

As it is the height of summer, most of your garden plants will be at their peak of growth and require plenty of pruning and general tidying up.

Pruning and tidying up pond plants.

Your pond plants are no different, and therefore should be cut back to stop them from taking over the whole pond and stopping light from reaching the bottom. Please note, any plants removed from the water should be left on the side of the pond for a few days, to allow the creepy crawlies to find their way back into the water. There will still be plenty of invertebrates in your pond, hatching out into some winged creature until the first frosts. It was while I was carrying out some of this work in my pond, that I disturbed a creature quite common around these parts, and somewhat of a contradiction. It was a Slow Worm (Anguis Fragilis)

Slow Worms

Despite their name, slow worms, are neither slow nor a worm. They are, in fact, a legless lizard. Amazingly, they can live up to 30 years, and grow up to 50 cm. The female is considerably bigger than the male. According to Wikipedia a specimen in a Copenhagen Zoo, lived to 54 years! They are mainly nocturnal animals, hiding away in your compost heap during the day, but during sunny days, they like to sit on a rock or a patch of dry ground to warm up, as they are cold blooded creatures. If you want to attract them to your garden, a good trick is to lay a sheet of corrugated tin or plastic on the ground. They will then crawl under to warm up. I have found at least 10 hiding under a single sheet recently.

They can be seen from March to October, as they hibernate during the colder months. They are good to have in your garden, as they are one of the few animals that will eat slugs. They certainly won't starve in my garden!! They give birth to live young and have certain key features which differentiates them from snakes. They have eyes with eyelids that blink, have visible ears, they shed their skins in patches, and their scale pattern is different to snakes.

Autonomy

One of the coolest thing that they do is something called autotomy. When they are in danger, from predation maybe, they have the ability to shed their tail. The tail will continue to wriggle, while the head end will guickly hide away. With luck, this will save its life. I have no information on whether they can do this 'trick' more than once but, apparently, they never grow back to their full size after losing their tail. If you are lucky enough to find one, do not hold it too tightly, as it may decide that you are a predator and shed its tail. Despite slow worms being relatively common in the UK, they are at risk from keen gardeners, who can inadvertently kill them during disturbance of the compost heap, or when strimming long grass. They are also predated by domestic cats, I know this because, sadly our cat has killed a few.

Marathon walk for charity. Saturday 3rd August

Boy that was a long walk!

Over 30 of us left Northlew at 6:15 am in the Taw & Torridge coach followed by Tracey in the support vehicle. Barnstaple station for 7:20 am and after the first loo stop we were off & within a couple of yards I nearly went the wrong way....

Along the Tarka trail to Bideford with our first stop and sausage sandwiches only a couple of miles down the route at Fremington Quay, delicious. Even by that point it was clear that the walkie talkies would be a vital addition to the walk kit. Utter nonsense! That's what happens when you leave one in Daniel's control. Lovely and cool morning stroll with views across the estuary and on to Instow and another food stop, oh and Colin arrived on his bike.

Should point out that we had our own historian in the group as Ray's dad worked on the railway back in the day on the very route of the walk. A train would have been easier....

Then there was the long walk into Bideford, past the new bridge and there was a little moisture in the air, to be fair during the day there were a few spells of rain, but really only showers and they were almost more refreshing than annoying. Now during this section the team of walkers started to splinter and I can't really tell you what happened to all but the rear gunners, but hey ho I have the keyboard so here goes.

Bideford 8.5 miles completed, that's a good walk already, us at the rear arrived in time to see the next walkers about 400 yards ahead so we stopped for our coffee at the Blacksmiths Arms it being 10:59 and near as damit opening time.

The next 5 mile section was to the Puffing Billy at Great Torrington again along the Tarka trail, the track became a little more gravelly and we left company of the estuary and roads and cut through the countryside. There are way markers quite regularly and using modern technology you can get to amazing commentaries about nature work, ports, clay works etc etc, but my best fact in this section is that Tarka was born here, by an oak tree – just not quite sure which one..... The Puffing Billy was a welcome stop, and the food truck was there and hot beverage dispenser also with Andrew and Pam. Now I think we gained Trish. Alex and lain and lost Mai and Simon but that happened ahead of me. Doombar consumed and a take away cider (thanks Kerry) off on the 9 off mile stretch to Petrockstowe. I think this was the most challenging section mentally, especially as within a few miles we past a sign for the Green Dragon.... The wrong one..... A gradual uphill section with lovely scenery but nothing stand out and long 3 mile sections taking an age before meeting up with the support vehicles now with Tracey and Phil and Steve L. The gravel got in shoes, it felt a long way.

Turning off the Tarka trail ½ a mile out from Petrockestowe we were on soil tarmac and encountered our first proper hill.... deep breath and then the Larrels came into view. What met us in the pub car park was a scene of carnage.... bodies lying everywhere.... OK maybe not quite that bad, but it did knock out a few of our more sturdy chaps, but we were 23 miles in, a marathon would only be another 3 miles and actually I think we'd really already done that. By this point the time span between the front sprinters and us sweepers was in the region of 2 hours.

Petrockstowe to Sheepwash on the back lanes seemed like a dash but was another 3 odd miles, the Half Moon was well into evening service when we rounded the corner into the square. Refreshed the quick downhill and then uphill slog to Highampton and the Golden Inn – which was open! And then the final trek back to Northlew.

This section was again 3 or 4 miles and by this time it was getting late and darker.... and darker.... till at the top of Norley it was pretty much pitch black. Emergency rations arrived from both Pam and Tracey so fuelled by white wine and jager we surged up that horrible hill and at long last into Northlew and the welcoming bosom of the Green Dragon (3 hours odd later than the first slightly more sober walkers!)

Now I could try and list everyone who did the walk, but the Northlew News may charge me for the extra ink..... so here's a photo of some, if not all, of the crew.....



In summary though.... 34 people walked and there were 6 in our support crews across 4 vehicles.

To everyone that walked, helped or donated you are all amazing and thank you. 16 did the full distance which is crazy, 32 miles officially although I think probably more like 34. Of these there are 2 women I would especially like to mention. Julia carried on after being knocked to the ground by a bike within the first 12 odd miles. It wasn't just a little fall we had chipped teeth, cuts on her chin, broken phone and she'd only just got her back sorted earlier this year. And the other is my wife, Shuv, who completed the distance 7 months after a hip replacement. I'm officially blaming her for the state of my knees now!

We wanted a challenge and, as every year, the village rose to the challenge. Next year it won't be as long it'll be from Northlew Green Dragon to the other Green Dragon in Langtree and back which will be back at marathon distance. Watch out for the date.

So, thank you again, we have raised just shy of £1,500 currently for the cancer support charity Something to Look Forward to. I urge you to go online and look at the work they're doing, it's such a good idea and Fiona who set-up the charity is truly inspirational.
