The Hatherleigh and Northlew Training brass band entered the 73rd South West Brass Band Association competition on Sat 2nd November at the Riviera Centre in Torquay. It was a major step for a band that formed about a year ago and most of the current players are only six months into their playing career. The band isn't not just for the younger generation, we now have Mums & retirees who have joined the ranks learning to play brass instruments, but it is mainly about the kids and they were brilliant.



The day itself happened to be the Rugby World Cup final day so most of us arrived very early in Torquay to see England battle in vain against the Boks before gathering in the holding area before our performance. The set-up was exactly the same as for the West of England finals so was an amazing experience for the youngsters who it must be said showed a lot less nerves than older members of the band.



Onto the big stage with all the bright lights and expectant crowd and we played our three pieces, Fanfare for an Occasion, the hymn Lloyd & the finale, a catchy number A Grand Grand Waltz with Adrian Edwards conducting. The performance was met by rapturous applause, the audience and adjudicators understanding the importance of getting new blood playing brass instruments as well as being impressed by the confident and clean playing.

From the Parish Archive

Thanks to Parish Councillor Judy Jones for compiling these fascinating articles from the books recording the minutes of the parish council meetings.

100 years ago this month, December 1919: a death, a memorial and a most unusual gift!

Setting the national scene:

Just to give you a flavour of what was happening on the national scene a century ago this month.... **3rd February 1919** Éamon de Valera, the leader of Sinn Féin, and two other prisoners escaped from Lincoln Prison in England in a break personally arranged by Michael Collins and Harry Boland. **31st July** the Housing, Town Planning, &c. Act 1919 provided government subsidy for the provision of council houses, with the target of completing 500,000 houses by 1922.

15th August the Restoration of Pre-War Practices Act provided

for returning servicemen to get their old jobs back

11th November the first Remembrance Day was observed with a two minutes silence at 11:00 hrs.

*I*st *December* Nancy Astor (Viscountess Astor) became the first woman to take her seat in the House of Commons having stood at the Plymouth Sutton by-election to succeed her husband as *a* Unionist member.

15th December meat rationing ended.

22nd December a bill '...to provide for the better government of Ireland' was introduced into the House of Commons, proposing two parliaments: one for the six counties of north-east Ulster and one for the other twenty-six.

Changes for women

And for women there was a particularly important event; on **23**rd **December** the Sex Disqualification (Removal) Act removed legal impediments on women entering the secular professions stating that...

'A person shall not be disqualified by sex or marriage from the exercise of any public function, or from being appointed to or holding any civil or judicial office or post, or from entering or assuming or carrying on any civil profession or vocation, or for admission to any incorporated society (whether incorporated by Royal Charter or otherwise) ...'

It's hard to know what real difference this made to the women of Northlew and how it impacted upon the Council in the short term. I could have missed something, but it seems from my review of the Parish Minutes that the first woman Councillor (Mrs. Lacey) wasn't appointed until 45 years later in 1964. Can anyone in the Village tell me if this is correct, or give me any information about Councillor Mrs. Lacey? If you can please send me an email on jjones@northlewparishcouncil.org. uk - I'd love to find out more about what is potentially a landmark event.

Northlew 1919

So, having set the scene a bit let's find out more about what was happening right here in the village during 1919.

The first meeting of the year was held on 4th February 1919. It was attended by Councillors John Brooking, William Brooking, Henry Pellew, Albert Pascoe, Henry James Adams, John Adams, Roger Jackman and Henry James Friend. Chairman Reverend John

Worthington was unable to attend due to illness, so the meeting was Chaired by Henry Pellew. This wasn't a particularly exciting meeting; discussions focussed on footpath repairs (a regular topic), the 'Housing of the Working Classes Act' and the need for Workmen's Cottages. It was resolved to ask Okehampton Rural District Council for 6 cottages to be built, land being 'no doubt available' if Government assistance could be obtained. By the time of the next meeting on March 17th 1919 Reverend John Worthington, a long-standing servant to the Parish (first became Chair in 1897), had died and Henry

Pellew was in the Chair. Discussions focussed on a letter to Okehampton Rural District Council about the proposed construction of the railway between Torrington, Okehampton and Moretonhampstead...

'We the members of the Northlew Parish Council do hereby heartily support the proposal for the construction of the Railway from Torrington to Okehampton and thence to Moretonhampstead. And would urge on all parties concerned the necessity of the scheme being carried out at an early date.' The question of a War Memorial was also raised, and it was agreed to discuss this further at the Annual Parish Meeting (where it was agreed to hold a joint meeting for the United Parishes of Northlew and Ashbury on 23rd April 1919.)

Also, on this day, the Election of Councillors for the coming year resulted in the following candidates being elected:

- John Adams, Middle & Overlake
- Henry James, Kesterfield
- William Brooking, Crowden
- Alfred Edward Bickle, West Kimber
- John Friend, Church Gate
- Henry James Friend, Rutleigh
- Roger Jackman, Higher Whiddon
- Albert Pascoe, Village
- Henry Pellew, Harpers Hill

At the next meeting, on April 15th 1919, Henry Pellew was elected Chairman of the newly elected Council.

For some reason, that's not at all obvious from the records, the next meeting didn't take place until December 17th 1919. This was a very interesting meeting! The Council had been offered a 'German Machine Gun' as a War Trophy and instructed the Clerk to accept it. It was also agreed that, should a Village Hall be built (and we know how that turned out) the trophy should be deposited there for safe keeping.

I've looked for more detail about this machine gun and I haven't found very much at all. And so, dear reader, do you know anything about it? Was it ever deposited in the Victory Hall, or elsewhere in the village for safe-keeping? If you know anything about it please send me an email on

jjones@northlewparishcouncil.org. <u>uk</u>

Of course, the usual more mundane matters were also discussed. Councillors were unhappy at the standard of work previously carried out to clean the gullies in the village, so the Clerk was instructed to write to the Sanitary Inspector requesting that any new appointee should be 'fully advised as to his duties' and that the Parish Council should be approached before the appointment is settled. There was discussion about the visit of the Inspector of Weights and Measures (be still my beating heart) and there was an apparently lengthy discussion about a recurring theme, the state of the roads in and around the village. On this occasion the focus of attention was the

roads leading to Okehampton between Gorhuish Down Cross and Hilltown and Councillors agreed to send a resolution to the Okehampton Rural District Council...

'That this Council begs to call the attention of your Council to the disgraceful state of the Road from Gorhuish Down Cross to Hilltown. the said Road being practically impassable for motor traffic and very dangerous for horses. The rate payers of Northlew are seriously aware of the ever-increasing demands made upon them for the upkeep of the Roads etc and now feel the time has arrived when they are entitled to some consideration and therefore hope your Council will give the matter attention.' So, there you have it; 100 years ago this month the Parish Council's focus was on a Trophy from World War I, sanitation, weights & measures and the state of the roads around Northlew.

Next time: the early years, from the Council's inaugural meeting in 1895 to December 1905. Find out what was decided about rating and valuation, the commissioning of a 'parish chest', elections, appointments of overseers, local education, the diamond jubilee, telegraph to the village, restoration of the old village cross and (you guessed it) the state of roads and paths around the village.

Gardening tips for the autumn and winter months

Early autumn jobs

Early autumn jobs include planting out wallflowers, forget me nots/any hardy annuals.

If you have bareroot wallflowers, always plant them deep and firm them well in; being related to brassicas, they too appreciate being protected from windrock. Winter pots can be planted up with 3 layers of bulbs (largest bulbs furthest down the pot). Or you can do separate pots with a mix of winter pansies/violas, primulas, trailing ivies, cyclamen or winter heathers. As a change from trailing ivy, I'm using a variety of Ajuga reptans called "Burgundy Glow", which is variegated, pale green and white with pink tinged younger leaves. The flowers are denim blue and very attractive to insects. Ajuga (Bugle) is in fact, a perennial evergreen that is often used as ground cover in borders. I've planted it up with Muscari (grape hyacinth) "White Magic" and "Pink Sunrise".

Garlic and onions

Get garlic cloves in if you haven't already and plant over-wintering Japanese onion sets. If you can, get the more expensive heat treated sets as these are less likely to bolt if the weather turns dry in May/early June as it did this year. Red onions are also more likely to bolt or become bull necked than white varieties.

Making leaf litter

Leaves are already starting to fall. If you want to collect them to make leaf litter, try stuffing them loosely into mesh nets like those used for bulk onions. The leaves will rot down much more quickly than in dustbin bags or an open bin (they tend to become compacted and dry in these).

Preventing the spread of mould

Keep checking on any pelargoniums/tender perennials that have been brought inside, for botrytis (fuzzy grey mould). This can spread like wildfire to other plants, so remove any infected leaves or stems and don't leave any stubs as these are particularly susceptible to rot and mould.

For the benefit of wildlife

Traditional garden advice has always been to cut perennial herbaceous plants down in late autumn to make the garden look neat. To an extent. I still do this smaller mound forming plants such as alchemilla mollis, hardy geranium and astrantia all benefit from a final haircut. Increasingly though, I'm leaving certain plants alone for the benefit of wildlife. Over the years, I've discovered dormice hibernating in nests under the leaves of crocosmia (montbretia) and ladybirds sheltering in the hollow stems of echinops and tall acanthus grasses. So, I leave these types of plants alone until early spring and new growth starts again.

Bulb planting, dividing perennials and mulching

Before mulching (probably the biggest autumn job), make sure all your bulb planting is done and any digging up and dividing of large clumps of perennials. Once the borders are ready, mulch thickly (at least 3-4" deep) with homemade compost, well rotted manure or (my preference) green waste soil conditioner available in bulk. Being generous with mulch pays huge dividends..... the difference in the following season is remarkable. A thin mulch won't suppress annual weeds or keep in moisture. Make sure the soil isn't frozen or too dry before you apply the mulch.

Dahlias and cannas

Wait for the first frosts to blacken dahlias and cannas before cutting them down and lifting, prior to storing in a frost-free place. I've actually left cannas in the ground all winter, mulching heavily with straw and found that they come up much more strongly the following spring, than the ones that were lifted as 'insurance".

Communication from Devon County Council regarding Ash Die Back

(This communication has been adapted for the Northlew News)

You may have heard through various media outlets that our much revered native ash trees are currently at a high risk of infection from Ash Dieback disease which may affect their health and eventually the stability of the whole tree in some instances. Devon County Council (DCC) are currently leading the way in the county with positive actions to encourage tree owners to take responsibility for their ash trees and to have them inspected by a qualified arborist where they present a risk to the Highway network.

DCC have produced a general information leaflet (please see page 41) which they are distributing to householders around the county and have also created a highly informative website about the disease and who is responsible for infected trees. This can be viewed at

https://www.devonashdieback.org.u k/. If any parishioner has concerns that Ash trees within our parish that grow alongside highways, byways, bridleways or footpath may be infected by Ash Dieback, these trees need to be reported to Devon County Council highways via their website at <u>https://www.devon.gov.uk/roadsand</u> <u>transport/report-a-</u> <u>problem/map/map_src/hzt/</u>.

If parishioners or tree owners require assistance in finding a suitably qualified and insured arborist, information is available via the following link: <u>https://trees.org.uk/Help-</u> <u>Advice/Public/Choose-your-Tree-</u> <u>Surgeon</u>

Furthermore if trees suspected of being infected are located within a Conservation Area or are subject to a Tree Preservation Order, an arborist should be able to advise whether the tree owner should apply for recommended works by the normal 6 or 8 week process or under a 5-day notice for emergency works to dead trees or trees which pose an immediate threat to persons or property. In either scenario, the tree owners or their appointed agent are responsible for following the required procedures for works to protected trees.
