By now we hope you have had the opportunity to visit the newly named **'The**

Square Shop' to see what's on offer. We are pleased to provide a range of daily staples and grocery basics, all sourced very locally as far as possible with an emphasis on freshly-baked daily bread, dairy produce, local meat, vegetables and fruit. Many items will be made by residents, e.g. bread, preserves/chutneys, cakes etc and fresh produce such as seasonal fruit and vegetables will come partly from a farm at Petrockstowe and also direct from a local smallholder - less than a mile away. You really cannot get more local than that! To re-iterate these items will be available daily and we are very pleased to announce that we are now able to open daily as follows:-

| 8-00am - 4.00pm | Weekdays |

| 10.00am - 12 noon | Saturdays |
| 10.00am - 12 noon | Sundays |

Remember some of the benefits of shopping locally:

- Deliveries will be available within the village to assist the elderly and residents with impaired mobility.
- Card payments will be possible for your convenience.
- We will be open daily from 8.00am -4.00pm on weekdays and from 10.00 - 12.00 at the weekend. Importantly when not open, a small range of daily staples will be kept available from The Green Dragon

thereby extending opening times to **11.00pm (10.00pm Sundays)** thanks to Dan.

- Fresh coffee and tea are available daily for £1.50 (or £2.50 with a slice of homemade cake) or perhaps a local ice cream when the weather warms up?
- We intend to sell a small range of wine, beer, cigarettes and tobacco products.
- We will continue to act as a collection point for prescriptions.
- We will promote the work of local people/artists/craftspeople and provide an outlet for them as there are many talented individuals living in and around the village.
- In time it is hoped to organise a tool bank/favours board/possible repair shop for the convenience of residents and if this is something that you would be interested in helping with then please get in touch. This is an idea we are keen to develop over time with the support of residents to increase

inclusion in village life, which has the potential to benefit all of us and to reduce our environmental impact.

We look forward to seeing you soon and remember that new volunteers are always more than welcome - whatever time you can offer would be a great help to us all.

Mothering Sunday and Mother's Day – a short history.

Everyone celebrates Mother's Day in their own way, from kids preparing mum a much-deserved breakfast in bed, to older children treating their mother to a quintessentially British afternoon tea. But while we see it as a universally beloved day of affection and celebration, Mothering Sunday isn't technically what you think it is. It's not even the same thing as Mother's Day.

The original Mothering Sunday

Mothering Sunday began as an explicitly religious event of the 16th Century, with no connection to mothers at all. The word "mothering" referred to the "mother church", which is to say the main church or cathedral of the region. It became a tradition that, on the fourth Sunday of Lent, people would return to their mother church for a special service. This pilgrimage was apparently known as "going amothering", and became something of a holiday event, with domestic servants traditionally given the day

off to visit their own families as well as their mother church.

Simnel Cake

One of the tastiest traditions of Mothering Sunday was the baking of Simnel cake. Often regarded as a purely Easter-related confection. this rich fruit cake is also tied to Mothering Sunday, as a bit of indulgence to make up for the general austerity of Lent (and a nice home-baked present to take home to your mother). Consisting of layers of cake and marzipan, a traditional Simnel cake also reflects the religious overtones of the event by being adorned with 11 balls of marzipan, representing all the disciples of Jesus, minus Judas.

Saving Mothering Sunday

Despite its long existence in British culture, Mothering Sunday eventually fell out of fashion at the dawn of the 20th century. This is where a lady named Constance Penswick-Smith enters the picture. The daughter of a vicar, she thought the loss of Mothering Sunday was a great shame, and worked hard to rekindle interest. even writing a book whose title clearly laid out her ambition - it was called The Revival of Mothering Sunday. As if that wasn't enough, she also founded the Society for the Observance of Mothering Sunday. Her determination paid off, and the fading festival was restored to the culture of the country, only with much more of a focus on celebrating motherhood. And this was due to an American influence...

Mother's Day

So, if our event is properly called Mothering Sunday, what is "Mother's Day"? Technically speaking it's a completely unrelated American event, invented by a woman called Anna Jarvis in 1908. Her initial inspiration was a desire to honour her own mother, who had been a militant peace activist during the US Civil War. Anna Jarvis's growing ambition to create a formal "Mother's Day" for all American mothers was literally laughed out of the room at first, with officials jokingly saying that it might lead to a "Mother-in-Law's Day". Anna Jarvis wasn't easily put off, though, and in 1914 US President Woodrow Wilson officially signed Mother's Day into existence.

The revolt against Mother's Day

It was Anna larvis who inspired our own Constance Penswick-Smith to revive the more religiouslyflavoured Mothering Sunday over here, although the two separate events have since become conflated in most people's minds. Interestingly, Anna Jarvis herself was the first person to condemn the growing commercialisation of Mother's Day and started organising boycotts of the event she herself created. One of her anti-Mother's Day protests even led to her arrest for disturbing the peace, and she was particularly appalled by ready-made Mother's Day cards, saying "A printed card means nothing except that you are too lazy to write to the woman who has done more for you than anyone in the world." Buying chocolates was a no-no as well. "You take a box to Mother." she scoffed. "and then eat most of it yourself. A pretty sentiment!"

The Weather – an update on our rainfall



2019 has turned out to be the wettest year for us since l

started measuring the rainfall here at the beginning of 2013. A total of 1471 mm (about 58") fell. However, November and December were not as wet as in 2018 which might surprise some. Compared to 2018 last year was also drier in the months of January, March, April and August.



The wettest month we have recorded so far was December 2018 with 251mm of rain and the driest was June 2018 with just 11mm.

Bryan and Marion Dufty have been recording rainfall for 40 years at Stoney Farm and the trend is interesting (although obviously very localised and might not reflect the whole of West Devon). The total rainfall over 10 year periods are interesting:

1980-89 14949mm 1990-99 13388mm 2000-09 12725mm 2010-19 12562mm

So, the general trend since 1980, is that it has actually got drier!

West Devon Neighbourhood Policing Team - February 2020



This bulletin is compiled by the West Devon Neighbourhood Police team. In this issue we highlight county lines, domestic abuse and local youth initiatives.

County Lines

County lines is a term used when drug gangs from big cities expand their operations to smaller towns, often using violence to drive out local dealers and exploiting children and vulnerable people to sell drugs. These dealers will use dedicated mobile phone lines known as 'deal lines' to take orders from drug users. In most cases the users or customers will live in a different area to where the dealers and networks are based, so drug runners are needed to transport the drugs and collect the payment.

Children and vulnerable adults are being used by drug dealers across the country to courier drugs and money*

The dealers commonly target children or adults-often with mental health or addiction problems- to act as drug runners or move cash under the radar of the law. People exploited in this way may be exposed to physical, mental and sexual abuse, and in some instances will be trafficked to areas a long way from home as part of the network's drug dealing business. Children often don't see themselves as victims or realise they have been groomed to take part in criminality so it is important we all play our part to understand county lines and speak out if we have concerns.

What can you do? Trust your instincts, even if someone is not involved in county lines drug dealing, they may be being exploited in some other way, so it is always worth speaking out. You can speak to your local police on 101 or in an emergency call 999. If you would rather remain anonymous call <u>CrimeStoopers</u> on 0800 555111. You can also call <u>Childline</u> on 0800 1111 or speak to the young people's service <u>Catch 22</u> who help youngsters involved. Victims are often forced to allow dealers to take up residence in their home. Know the signs.

Have you noticed new and regularly changing residents in your area, more people than usual calling at neighboring properties? Are there suspicious vehicles ? Landlords, has it been more difficult to contact your tenant or do they seem anxious or depressed? Is there evidence of substance abuse/drug paraphernalia when you check your properties?

Public transport is often used—What to look out for

Have you seen children travelling alone when they should be in school? (bus drivers be aware), are you noticing young people seemingly unfamiliar with your community? Is a child or vulnerable person you know being seen in a car or taxi with a stranger? Do you know of someone who goes missing for periods of time?

Look out for unexplained often unaffordable new things

Does a person you know have more money than usual or is buying clothes or more expensive items that you would not expect? Anti-social behavior can be an indicator and look out for injuries.

Local action taken against anti-social behaviour in Okehampton

The local neighbourhood team has been spending considerable amounts of their time dealing with young people causing problems locally. Initially it was hoped that traditional policing (officers on the beat) would work but subsequently the youth offending team were brought in leading to those involved being processed through the criminal justice system. Working with Okehampton college and the community safety partnership, the team have been looking at longer term initiatives to understand issues around truancy, exclusion and disengagement from school to help support the town's young people. Inspector Mark Sloman says that ' we're committed to working with the college and all the agencies involved to ensure the young people in our area get the help and support they need to make the right choices and stay out of trouble'.

Domestic abuse - it can affect anyone

Domestic abuve is the misuse of power and control by one person over another. This controlling behavior may be exerted in various ways such as by physical violence, emotional and/or psychological manipulation, forcing sexual acts or taking over finances. It can begin at any time, can be obvious or subtle, and can happen gradually or suddenly. It can happen to anyone regardless of age, race, religion, disability, lifescyle, culture or sexual orientation.

There are specially trained officers in your area —for Devon's Domestic abuse helpline call 0345 155 1074

Other information and helpful numbers can be found <u>here</u> on the Devon and Comwall Police website.

Clare's Law underpins a scheme allowing police to disclose to worried individuals details of their partners' abusive pasts. Domestic Violence Disclosure Scheme

If you are in a relationship and are worried that your partner may have been abusive in the past, you can find out through the Domestic Violence Disclosure Scheme (DVDS).

Are you worried that someone you know is in a relationship with a person that may harm tharm? You too can find out information through the DVDS scheme.

Requests made are thoroughly checked by a panel made up of police, probation services and other agencies to ensure information is only passed on where it is lawful, proportionate and necessary. More details are available from our website www.dc.police.uk/dvcs
